Barometers are instruments recognized as essential in weather forecasting. For years they have been




made with weather words "Fair," "Change" and "Stormy" at definite positions on the dial, and for years to come, doubtless, many will continue to be made that way. The Tyccs "Stormoguide," now available, is much simpler to read, since complete forecasts are plainly shown on the dial.

Directions for Use

The *Tycos* "Stormoguide" has the usual figured scale of a barometer, which at all times shows the scientific, or air-pressure, readings. In addition, sections of the dial inside this pressure scale are indicated by letters referring to the weather forecasts on the dial. The *Tycos* "Stormoguide" is "set" the same as any barometer; viz., by moving the brass index hand, by means of





These weather forecasts on the dial are based on barometer indications at sea-level. To furnish correct readings at any altitude above sea-level a barometer must be adjusted to allow for the effect of the altitude on the movement of the instrument. The Tyccs "Stormoguide" provides for this by having an altitude plate fitted

in its back. To make this adjustment it is necessary simply to revolve the back plate with the fingers until the arrow engraved in the back of the case points to the proper altitude indications for the location in which the instrument is to be used.

All Tyccs "Stormoguides" have 5-inch-diameter dials and revolving back for setting to give sea-level readings at points from 0 to 3500 feet above sea-level.

Any of them will be furnished, if so specified on the order, with revolving back for use in localities 3500 to 7000 feet above sea-level, at an additional cost of \$3.00.

All except No. 2255 have silvered metal dials with black-filled figures and words, and movements compensated to overcome changes of temperature. No. 2255 has a white enameled card dial and an ordinary movement (not compensated).
